Welcome

The National Memorial Arboretum is the Nation's year-round place to remember and is a space that all the family can enjoy. The Arboretum is an inspirational living landscape where families, friends and comrades celebrate lives lived and remember lives lost.

Situated at the corner of the National Forest, our 150-acre Arboretum is home to around 25,000 young and over 400 memorials. People from all walks of life are represented, with memorials to the Armed Forces, emergency services and civilian organisations.

The memorials are rich in design and symbolism with stories just waiting to be discovered.

Travel by public transport

- You can get to National Memorial Arboretum by train.
- The nearest train station is Lichfield Trent Valley. The train station is 5 miles / 8.1 km from National Memorial Arboretum.
- Lichfield Trent Valley station is located approximately five miles from the Arboretum. Lichfield City Station is approximately six miles from the Arboretum. Burton upon Trent railway station is approximately eight miles from the Arboretum. All are a short taxi drive away.

Taxi information: The Arboretum does not take any responsibility for taxi service availability or quality of service.

Parking

- We have a car park. There are accessible parking spaces. The parking is less than 50 metres from the main entrance. Parking is not free.
- There is a drop-off point at the main entrance. The drop-off point has a dropped kerb
- From the car park to the entrance, there is level access.
- Thirty accessible parking bays are available on a first come, first served basis (15 disabled bays and 15 wide bays for disabled/ family use) On special event days

alternative parking arrangements may apply, please visit our website or contact us on 01283 245 100 for further information and advice. The Arboretum's Car Park B, with a gravel surface, is located one hundred metres from the Remembrance Centre. This car park may not be suitable for wheelchairs or mobility scooters.

Car Parking Bays for Disabled Visitors

Arrival

Path to main entrance

- From the street to the main entrance, there is level access.
- The path is wide enough to accommodate both wheelchairs and mobility scooters.

Main entrance

- The main entrance has level access.
- The door is 1500mm wide.
- The main door is side hung and automatic.
- Access via two sets of doors is necessary; both are automatic. On occassions, when they do not operate automatically, volunteers are available to assist.

Getting around inside

Visual Impairment - General Information

- We have contrast markings on all glass doors, contrast markings on all full-height windows and high colour contrast between walls and doorframes.
- Some parts of the venue have low lighting.

Ticket/ information desk

Welcome Desk

- From the main entrance to the desk, there is level access. The route is 1500mm wide, or more.
- The door is 1500mm wide, or more.
- The desk has a low section.

Things to See and Do

The Arboretum Grounds

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. There is a permanent ramp. The route is wide enough to accommodate both wheelchairs and mobility scooters.
- Some display information is low, for wheelchair users. There are seats.
- Arboretum, accessible via roads, firm paths and grassed areas. Access from the Remembrance Centre is via automatic doors. One set of these doors is operated by push buttons at a height suitable for wheelchair and mobility scooter users. The doors open onto Heroes' Square, a flat paved area. The square leads to The Boyes Garden where there is a slope 2000mm wide with a gradient of 4.5% leading into the grounds. The slope leads to Millennium Avenue and the Aspects Building. Wooden benches are located throuout the grounds. There are three portable chemical toilets suitable for disabled users located beside the Shot at Dawn, Millennium and Christmas Truce shelters. Visitors can familiarise themselves with these locations using a Visitor Map available from the Welcome Desk or signs located in Heroes' Square and our shelters.

The Land Train

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. There is a permanent ramp. The route is wide enough to accommodate a wheelchair or mobility scooter. Some display information is low, for wheelchair users. There are seats.
- There is a hearing loop.
- The Arboretum offers an up to 50-minute guided Land Train tour of the site. A recorded commentary descibes memorials and Arboretum features during the tour. A hearing loop is provided. Tickets are available from the Welcome Desk. There is designated wheelchair access to the Land Train via a ramp. Please ask the Land Train operator for assistance onto the ramp and into the carriage. A step may be required to access other carriages, this step can be provided on request from the land train operator. Walking aids and mobility scooters are left at the Land Train

stop. There are normally two Land Trains in operation. Ramp access may vary from that shown below.

Far East Prisoners of War Exhibition

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. There is a permanent ramp. The route is 1500mm wide, or more. The door is 1500mm wide.
- Some display information is low, for wheelchair users. There are seats.
- There is a hearing loop.
- The Far East Prisoners of War Exhibition is accessed from Millennium and Giffard Avenues. There are access steps to the front of the building and a ramp to the left side. Access via this ramp may be restricted for larger mobility scooters. There is a disabled toilet to the inside right rear of the building. There are no staff or volunteers guides permanantly located at this building.

HIS Public toilet

Remembrance Centre Accessible Toilets

- There are two accessible toilets for disabled visitors in the Remembrance Centre.
 These toilets are not accessed using RADAR key.
- From the main entrance to the public toilet, there is level access. The route is 1500mm wide, or more.
- The toilet door is 900mm wide.
- The direction of transfer onto the toilet is to the left.
- There is 1700mm in front of the toilet. The toilet seat is 490mm high. The toilets have handrails.

Changing Places Facility



A Changing Places facility is available in the Remembrance Centre and is

accessed using a RADAR key. A RADAR key is also available at the Welcome Desk, and visitors with specific queries regarding our Changing Places Toilet are advised to speak to our Welcome Desk Team. The Changing Places Facility includes a ceiling hoist system, shower, privacy screen and easily accessible toilet with grab rails.

Additional Toilet Facilities

Baby change facilities are available in one of the diabled cubicles, this cubicle is 1300mm wide at the right side and 1300mm at the front and is fitted with a drop-down baby changing table. A second baby changing facility, with a fixed changing station, is located in the accessible toilet in Heroes' Square to the left of the Coffee Shop. A wide pan bariatric toilet is available in the male toilets and two wide pan bariatric toilets are available in the female toilet facilities.

There is a disabled toilet in Heroes' Square, to the left side of the Coffee Shop. A low level illuminated button suitable for access by wheelchair users opens the door automatically if the toilet is vacant. From inside the toilet the door can be locked/unlocked by an illuminated button on the left side wall. The door can also be locked/unlocked by the knob on the inside of the door.

There are three portable chemical toilets suitable for disabled users located beside the Shot at Dawn, Millennium and Christmas Truce shelters. Visitors can familiarise themselves with these locations at the Orientation area within the Remembrance Centre. They are also shown on the Orientation Guide available from the Welcome Desk.

Gift Shop

- From the main entrance to the shop, there is level access. The route is 1000mm wide, or more. The door is 1500mm wide.
- The route through the shop is 800mm wide, or more.

Place to eat and drink

The Restaurant

- From the main entrance to the dining area, there is level access. The route is 3000mm wide, or more. To get to a table, there are no steps.
- Menus are shown on a wall mounted video screen and individual options are shown on printed cards or boards at the serveries and cabinets.
- If you need table service, staff can help you.
- The route through the dining area is 800mm wide, or more.
- There is background music sometimes.
- The table and plates have high colour contrast.
- We cater for sugar free (diabetic), vegetarian, gluten free (celiacs), lactose free (dairy free), low fat, low potassium, low sodium, high fibre and vegan specific diets.
- The Restaurant seating and servery are accessible to wheelchair users. Seating can be moved where required. Menu options are displayed on a wall-mounted video screen and printed signage at the front of the servery. Children's portions and high chairs are available. Bottle warming facilities are also available in the Restaurant, contact a member of our Foodservices Team for assistance. Where possible all food produce is locally sourced. Special dietary requirements are catered for, visitors are advised to contact the Arboretum on 01283 245 100 before their visit, or contact a member of our Foodservices Team for further information.

Place to eat and drink

The Coffee Shop

- From the main entrance to the dining area, there is level access. The route is 1500mm wide, or more. The door is 1500mm wide.
- To get to a table, there are no steps.
- Menus boards are available at the counter and cabinets
- If you need table service, staff can help you.
- The route through the dining area is 800mm wide, or more.
- There is background music sometimes.
- The table and plates have high colour contrast.
- We cater for sugar free (diabetic), vegetarian, gluten free (celiacs), lactose free (dairy free), low fat, low potassium, low sodium, high fibre and vegan specific diets.
- The Coffee Shop seating and servery are accessible to wheelchair users. Seating can be moved where required. Menus boards are available at the counter and cabinets. Children's portions and high chairs are available. Bottle warming facilities are also available in the Restaurant, contact a member of our Foodservices Team for assistance. Where possible all food produce is locally sourced. Special dietary requirements are catered for, visitors are advised to contact the Arboretum on 01283 245 100 before their visit, or contact a member of our Foodservices Team for further information.

Landscapes of Life Exhibition

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. The route is 940mm wide, or more.
- The door is 940mm wide.
- There is a clear contrast between the floors and walls. Exhibition content is positioned at a height appropriate for wheelchair users. Portable, lightweight, foldable seats are available in the Landscapes of Life exhibition..

Millennium Chapel

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. The route is 1500mm wide, or more.
- The door is 800mm wide.
- The Millennium Chapel has double doors, the right side is 800mm wide, the left door is 900mm wide and assistance may be required to open this normally fixed door. Arboretum volunteers are available to offer assistance with entry to the chapel at 10.50am prior to the Act of Remembrance. At other times assistance can be provided by asking at the Welcome Desk or by any available volunteer.

Learning Centre

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. The route is 1500mm wide, or more.
- The door is 1500mm wide.
- Access to the Learning Centre is by pre-booking groups only. Entry is via a double set of automatic doors separate from the general public entry.
 There is one disabled toilet in this area, the door is 800mm wide. The toilet has a left approach with 120mm side width and 1500mm front approach. The toilet seat height is 490mm from the floor. There are four standard toilet cubicles with 800mm door width.

Aspects Building

 From the main entrance to this area, there is ramped or level access. There is a permanent ramp. The route will accommodate both wheelchairs and mobility scooters.

- The door is 1500mm wide.
- Unless otherwise indicated the Aspects Building is reserved for pre-booked events and is not open to general visitors.
- The Aspects Building is accessed from Millennium Avenue via four steps to the front and a ramp to the right side. This ramp is 24.66 meters long, two meters wide, and has a gradient of 2.4%. The ramp is suitable for wheelchair and mobility scooter access.

The automatic sliding doors into the building open to 1500mm wide as visitors approach them. These doors lead to a lobby area and a further set of automatic sliding doors.

There is a disabled toilet with baby changing facilities in the Aspects Building. Additionally there are toilet cubicles with outward opening doors in the other public toilets, these are more user friendly for wheelchair users.

In addition to the entrance ramp and steps at the front of the building there is a temporary ramp that can be placed at the rear terrace exit in case of emergency.

Aspects Building Meeting Rooms: Alder, Chestnut, Hornbeam and Willow

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access.
- Doors into the Alder, Chestnut, Hornbeam and Willow meeting rooms are inwardly opening. The doors are 87mm (34 inches) wide.

Getting around outside

Arboretum Grounds

- From the main entrance to the gardens, there is level access.
- There is a permanent ramp.

- The route is sloped, and will accommodate both wheelchairs and mobility scooters
- From Heroes' Square visitors can enter the grounds and the Aspects building via the Boyes Garden.

There is access via a slope with a gradient of 4.5%. This route also gives access to the Aspects Building. The Arboretum is largely flat and is serviced by level firm paths; other areas of the grounds are grassed.

An accessible buggy, that can accomodate wheelchairs is available. Contact the Welcome Desk for availability.

Picnic Area

Children's Woodland and Picnic Area

• From the car park to the picnic area, there is level access. You can bring your own food to the picnic area.

Armed Forces Memorial

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. There is a permanent ramp. The route will accommodate both wheelchairs and mobility scooters.
- Access to the Armed Forces Memorial is via smooth causeway and a flight of steps or the spiral Pilgrims' Way. The Pilgrims' Way has a gradient of 1.8%. Visitors who require access can be taken to the summit of The Memorial and returned to its base by buggy. Please contact a member of the team if further assistance is required. This service is subject to availability, and on busy days there may be a short wait.

Far East Prisoner of War Building

- From the main entrance to this area, there is level access. There is a permanent ramp.
- There is a four-meter ramp with a gradient of 6% to the side of the Far East Prisoners of War building. Alternatively there are three steps at the front of the building.

There is a turning space of 1200mm opposite the double door set that open outwards at the top of the ramp into the building. Visitors in wheelchairs or mobility scooters may require assistance to gain access.

The information panels provided have clear print. A video with sound plays in the building, the video depicts the experiences of a selection of WWII Far East prisoners of war.

The Far East Prisoners of War building houses an accessible toilet, with a vertical hand transfer and emergency cord.

Customer care support

Accessibility equipment

- We provide wheelchairs. Wheelchairs are free.
- We have a hearing loop in Welcome Desk, Restaurant, Gift Shop, Chapel, Land Train and Aspects.
- We can provide mobility scooters for a £10 hire fee. We advise booking by calling 01283 245100. Subject to availability we can loan blankets to wheelchair and mobility scooter users.
- Whilst we welcome dogs into our grounds, dogs are not permitted onto scooters, golf buggies or the land train, excluding assistance dogs.
- We have an area to charge mobility scooters and battery powered wheelchairs.
- Please contact the Welcome Desk for advice and assistance.

Emergency evacuation procedures

- We have emergency evacuation procedures for disabled visitors.
- The alarm system when activated will cause all automatic doors to open. Staff
 members and volunteers will provide guidance and assistance in the event of an
 evacuation. Our fire assembly point is located at the Falkands Memorial.

Customer care support

- · Some staff have disability awareness training.
- Some staff have BSL training.
